

How Do I Find a Lawyer?

If you find yourself in a situation where you need a lawyer, but don't know how to find one, a lawyer referral service may be able to help you. Lawyer referral services are designed to help you find a private lawyer in your geographic area who welcomes new clients. Attorneys listed with these services frequently have special arrangements regarding the fee charged for an initial consultation. However, each service has its own specific rules, which you should ask when you call. about For a referral to a lawyer who practices in

How Can I Be Sure of a Lawyer's Qualifications?

To protect you, by law only lawyers may give legal advice. The right to practice law in Pennsylvania is granted by the Supreme Court of PA. Only after a lawyer demonstrates knowledge and skill in the law is he or she admitted to the bar. This is your assurance that he or she has been found qualified to represent clients. Admission to the bar, however, does not ensure that a lawyer has knowledge and skill in every area of the law. You should ask questions to find out if a lawyer has experience with cases like yours. All lawyers on the LRS are members in good standing of the Washington County Bar Association and PA Supreme Court Disciplinary Board.

The practice and conduct of lawyers registered and qualified to practice law within Pennsylvania is governed by the Supreme Court of PA and by the Rules of Professional Conduct.

How Does a Lawyer Set Fees?

An attorney may charge on a flat fee basis for handling a particular type of case; a contingent fee (based on percentage of recovery or amount involved); on an hourly basis; or a combination of these fees. Be sure to discuss fees at your initial meeting and to have the fee gareement confirmed in writing. Factors that influence fees include the novelty or difficulty of the case; time limitations; time and labor required; related business expenses; and the lawyer's experience and skill. Simple problems, involving routine, well-established procedures, will cost less than complex matters that raise unique questions or require work in a more specialized field of law.

How Does the WCBA LRS Work?

The fee for the first half-hour consultation with a lawyer is **<u>\$50</u>**, payable to the Washinaton County Bar Association prior to your appointment with an attorney.

If you are using the online referral service (www.washcobar.community.lawyer) you can pay by credit card. If you are calling 724-225-6710, you can pay by credit card, too. Or, send a check or a money order to 119 South College Street, Washington, PA 15301 (be sure to include your name, phone number, and information about your legal issue). Online or calling and paying by credit card is quicker.

Referrals are made based primarily on casetype and geographic location, with other factors such as handicapped-accessibility, languages spoken, etc. taken into account if applicable.

The purpose of the consultation is for you to more fully explain your legal issue, and for the attorney to determine whether or not he/ she is able or willing to represent you. Any arrangements beyond that first half-hour appointment should be discussed and agreed upon by you and your lawyer. You are not obligated to hire the attorney, and the attorney is not obligated to provide legal advice at the consultation.

If you and the attorney are not able to schedule a mutually convenient consultation date/time, or if in the course of the consultation the attorney realizes that he/she has a conflict of interest in the case, the LRS can find another attorney for you without a second consultation fee, or we can refund your LRS fee. If the attorney notifies us that he/she feels the case has no legal merit, or if you want to discuss your case with a different attorney, you would need to pay a second LRS consultation fee to use the Service to find another attorney for a second opinion.
